### **Co-Presidents Message**

Here in Ontario, it is Spring when the hemisphere begins to warm significantly, causing new plant growth to "spring forth," giving the season its name. Snow begins to melt, swelling streams with runoff, and frosts become less severe. In climates that have no snow, and rare frosts, air and ground temperatures increase more rapidly.

May is the busiest time of the year for Streetsville Horticultural Society members! We are waiting, and sometimes it feels like waiting some more, to get out in our gardens and see what survived the winter.

While doing the gardeners' walk, which we all do, just put your head down and walk your garden, paying close attention to what's happening at ground level.

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#### MAY 2023 FLOWER SHOW

#### HORTICULTURE

- Class 1 Bleeding Heart (Dicentra), any colour 1 stem
- Class 2 Branch, flowering 36" or less
- Class 3 Collection of small spring flowers, 5 different cultivars, attached foliage only 1
- entry per exhibitor
- Class 4 Columbine (Aquilegia) 1 spray
- Class 5 Hellibore any colour, 1 stem
- Class 6 Iris, Tall bearded, over 27 inches 1 stalk
- Class 7 Iris, any other variety 1 stalk
- Class 8 Muscari 3 stems, same variety, no foliage
- Class 9 Narcissus, large cup, 1 scape
- Class 10 Narcissus, small cup, 1 scape
- Class 11 Narcissus, any other, 1 scape
- Class 12 Polygonatum (Solomon's Seal) 1 stem
- Class 13 Rhubarb, 3 stalks, pulled not cut, leaves trimmed to 2" fan shape
- Class 14 Tulips (Tulip) single, 1 bloom
- Class 15 Tulips (Tulip) any other variety, 1 bloom
- Class 16 Any other bulb, corm, rhizome or tuber not listed 1 stem
- Class 17 Any other Perennial not listed 1 stem or bloom



DESIGN - Theme: Spring Pallet Class 18 "Green Man" - a design using only green plants.

All entries MUST be placed on the table by 7:15 p.m. and must be left on table until Show Convenor releases entries. Each entry MUST have an entry tag. Entrants must supply their own container. Only Show Committee members can move entries on the table.

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**Species Tulips** 



Most species tulips are star-or bowl-shape. The star-shape tulips usually stand 4 to 8 inches high, with flowers in softer shades of purple, pink, white, or yellow. Bowl-shaped species tulips, reaching up to 14 inches in height, usually bloom in brilliant red, although some are yellow. The stems—shorter and sturdier than those of most hybrid tulips—make them less susceptible to the sudden harsh winds of erratic spring weather.

Many species tulips originated in the rocky areas surrounding the Mediterranean. This is why rock gardens are ideal places in which to plant them. These dry sites, with good drainage, imitate their native growing conditions. Plus, the bulb's small size fits the scale of most rock gardens. The dry, well-drained conditions of herb gardens also support wild tulips. One eye-catching treatment is star-shape species hybrid 'Little Beauty' planted to sprout in the midst of a mat of thyme. The effect in bloom is delightful.

In the garden, species tulips attract attention when viewed against a solid-color background of ground covers such as vinca and ajuga. They can also hold their own in a colorful mixed display of other spring bulbs, such as narcissus, hyacinth, scilla, and chionodoxa. They self seed to encourage naturalizing, avoid deadheading.

Apartment and urban enthusiasts do not despair: Many species tulips will produce more than one flower per stem, making them perfect for containers. **Grace Nelham** 





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
### **Plant Sale**
