PREPARING YOUR TOOLS FOR WINTER

- ✓ Clean tools with a wire brush and wipe off
- ✓ Put a few drops of WD40 or motor oil on implement (hoes, shovels, picks etc.)
- \checkmark Rub oil in with cloth.
- ✓ Sharpen with file.
- ✓ Store for winter.

TIP: Keep a 5-gallon bucket of and mixed with 2/3 quart of motor oil near your shed door. Whenever you return a tool to the shed, knock off the soil, then plunge the tool into the sand a few times. Brush off sand and store tool as normal.
