



#### "Choosing the Best...the Process" The Trial Garden Program at the University of Guelph" by Rodger Tschanz

Rodger Tschanz has worked in the field of horticulture at the University of Guelph since graduating in 1989. He is currently a research technician with the Department of Plant Agriculture at the University of Guelph where here is involved with ornamental breeding projects, teaching plant ID, and liaising with high school horticultural and science students. He has also been the manager of the Guelph Ornamental Trial Garden program since its inception in 2001. This program has trial sites in Guelph, Milton, Vineland and at the Royal Botanical Gardens in Burlington. Between 400 and 500 new annuals and perennials are evaluated each year for their suitability to the southern Ontario gardens.

#### April: Go green!!

The unprecedented global destruction and rapid reduction of plant and wildlife populations are directly linked to causes driven by human activity: climate change, deforestation, habitat loss, trafficking and poaching, unsustainable agriculture, pollution and pesticides to name a few. The impacts are far reaching.

If we do not act now, extinction may be humanity's most enduring legacy. All living things have an intrinsic value, and each plays a unique role in the complex web of life. The good news is that the rate of extinctions can still be slowed, and many of our declining, threatened and endangered species can still recover if we work together now to build a united global movement of consumers, voters, educators, faith leaders, and scientists to demand immediate action.

Earth Day Network is asking people to DO simple and easy tasks to protect the earth, save money and make every day Earth Day. You can make a difference! Join a local park, river or beach cleanup.

- Use environmentally-friendly, non-toxic cleaning products.
- Carpool, ride your bike, use public transportation or drive an electric or hybrid car.
- Stop using disposable plastics, especially single-use plastics like bottles, bags and straws.

- <u>Recycle paper, plastic and glass</u>. Reduce your garbage by 10% and your carbon footprint by 1,200 pounds a year.
- Use cloth towels instead of paper ones.
- Change your paper bills to online billing. You'll be saving trees and the fuel it takes to deliver your bills by truck.
- Read documents online instead of printing them.
- Collect used printer, fax, and copier cartridges to recycle.
- Choose reusable utensils, trays, and dishes in the cafeteria and reusable bottles and mugs for coffee.
- Bring reusable bags when you shop. Pack your lunch in a reusable bag.
- Grow your own organic garden, or join a farmshare group.
- Compost kitchen scraps for use in your garden

- Pull out invasive plants in your yard or garden and replace them with native ones.
- Take the stairs instead of the elevator to save energy (and get exercise!).

Shirley Boyes will be transforming plastic jugs, into planters so save a few, make sure they have lids







1	Bleeding Heart (Dicentra), any colour - 1 stem
2	Branch, flowering –36" or less
3	Clematis – 1 vine, not over 18 inches
4	Collection of small spring flowers, 5 different cultivars, attached foliage only. 1 entry per exhibitor.
5	Columbine (Aquilegia) – 1 spray
6	Hellebore – any colour, 1 stem
7	Iris, Tall bearded, over 27 inches -1 stalk
8	Iris, any other variety - 1 stalk
9	Lilac (Syringa) – 1 truss (compact cluster on one stem)
10	Muscari – 3 stems, same variety, no foliage
11	Narcissus, large cup, - 1 scape
12	Narcissus, small cup, - 1 scape
13	Narcissus, any other, - 1 scape
14	Paeonia (Peony) Tree – 1 bloom, disbudded
15	Polygonatum (Solomon's Seal) – 1 stem
16	Rhododendron – 1 truss ( compact cluster on 1 stem)
17	Rhubarb, 3 stalks, pulled not cut, leaves trimmed to 2" fan shape
18	Tulipa (Tulip) – single, 1 bloom
19	Tulipa (Tulip) – any other variety, 1 bloom
20	Any other Bulb, corm, rhizome or tuber not listed – 1 stem
21	Any other Perennial not listed – 1 stem or bloom
22	African Violet – 1 dish
