Two thousand two hundred and twenty-four (2224) plants had to be organized and placed in the right places on the field, it started raining about 7am and didn't stop until about 1pm, we had a brief respite for about 20 minutes. At 2.30 as we finished the clean up the skies opened, and a deluge of rain fell. A total of 28 mm of rain fell on May 25<sup>th</sup>, 2019.

According to those who remember many more plant sales than I do it has never rained like that on plant sale day. The grass was churned up by many feet, a car got stuck in the mud and had to call CAA for a tow, and we coped!
