The room was abuzz as 63 members attended the May meeting to receive their premium plant, participate in the first flower show of the year, and await guest speaker, Claudette Sims. Claudette discussed the devastating loss of insects and birds, harmful effects of invasive plants, and how the gardening community can help repair the damage. She asked thought provoking questions such as "Have you seen a grasshopper lately or clouds of moths at night circling lights"? After getting our attention, she suggested the following ideas to incorporate into our gardening practices:

- 1) Plant 70% Native Plants (A few each year)
- 2) Reduce lawn size (Think area rug, not carpet)
- 3) Avoid insecticides, chemicals, and bug zappers
- 4) Plant trees, such as oaks which house many insects' species

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May Speaker Answers

Our May speaker, Claudette, kindly sent the following information in answer to questions from the audience: Rose of Sharon-is it invasive. While it does self-seed like crazy, it is not on the Credit Valley Conservation Priority Invasive Plant list. Periwinkle attracting bumble bees? It does appear to attract bumble bees which are generalist bees. But any pollen available would be limited to when it is in flower, so it would be a poor choice for pollinators. I found nothing on the quality of the pollen-that varies a lot with each plant and usually non-native plant pollen is not the best. Bees also need floral resources from spring to fall. And given that it is so invasive that it crowds out other plants and tree seedlings, it would be the only thing growing in a forest, so there would be little to eat and therefore a huge threat to biodiversity. The Auditor General for Ontario recommended it should not be sold or shared in Ontario, and recommends

that they should be regulated under the Invasive Species Act in the Nov 2022 report.

Here's what Illinois Wildflowers has to say about periwinkle: Anthophorine bees (<u>Anthophora spp.</u>), mason bees (<u>Osmia spp.</u>), and bee flies (including <u>Bombylius major</u>). In Illinois, such insect visitors appear to be few. The seeds are too small to be of any interest to birds, and the foliage is toxic to mammalian herbivores. This plant appears to have little ecological value to fauna.

Burning bush-invasiveness: It is highly invasive-spread by birds and animals. It will dominate an entire forest floor. It is a huge problem in High Park in Toronto. It is regulated in a number of border states. It is also a plant the Auditor General of Ontario said should not be sold.

Halton Master Gardeners have created a map of nurseries and seeds suppliers for the gardening public. Nurseries selling native plants are starred in green. Common commercial nursery chains have not been included as they are often well known. This link is for the map.

HORTICULTURE

Class 1	Allium - small under 4", same cultivar, 3 stems
Class 2	Allium - large, 1 stem
Class 3	Clematis - 1 large bloom
Class 4	Collection of perennial flowers in container, 5 different cultivars, no cut foliage - 1 entry per Exhibitor
Class 5	Day Lily (Hemerocallis) - 1 scape
Class 6	Dianthus - 1 cultivar - 2 stems
Class 7	Fern, Japanese painted - 3 fronds
Class 8	Heuchera (Coral Bells) - 3 stems in bloom, same cultivar
Class 9	Heuchera (Coral Bells) - 3 leaves, same cultivar
Class 10	Hosta - 3 leaves, different cultivars
Class 11	Hosta - 3 leaves, same cultivar
Class 12	Iris miniature - under 8", any colour, 1 stalk
Class 13	Iris, any variety, 1 stalk
Class 14	Lavender - 3 stems in bloom
Class 15	Peony (Paeonia) - double/semi-double, 1 bloom
Class 16	Peony (Paeonia) - single, Japanese or Anemone, 1 bloom
Class 17	Rosa (Rose) - grandiflora, floribunda, polyantha - 1 spray
Class 18	Rosa (Rose) - modern shrub, 1 bloom or spray
Class 19	Rosa (Rose) - Judged for fragrance, any variety - 1 bloom
Class 20	Any other perennial not listed - 1 bloom or stem
Class 21	Any annual not listed - 3 blooms or stems (must have been in your possession for 90 days)
Class 22	My Blue Heaven - a design
