








Annual General Meeting Reports

President's Report

At the end of the year, it is always interesting to look back at what our society has done during the last 12 months.

Last fall, we received a \$2500 donation from the **Ralph Faustino** memorial fundraiser and planted 25 trees at the Leslie Log House property with the donated money. We also purchased two serviceberry trees to be planted



We have been actively promoting our society in the Streetsville area. We held *Bring a Friend* night in October

2015 and an *Open House* in April 2016, 22 guests attended and 10 of those guests joined SHS.

We had very well-attended flower shows in September and October 2015. A new flower show committee was formed in April and held successful shows in May and June.

Our volunteers have been very busy this year. On May 7, we hosted the District 15 AGM, a team of dedicated members contributed their time and lots of energy ensuring that the event was successful. **Nicky Hall** and **Debra Buckler** headed the team that ran the AGM flower

show. **Amgad Boles** and **Lynn Merritt** led the organization of the event.

Our fundraisers included a silent auction bake sale at our December workshop which raised \$200 and Vesey's bulbs \$749.50. Although our annual plant sale was held on an extremely hot day, many customers complimented us on the health of the plants. Carol Ashford was the organizing genius behind this year's plant sale; she asked Sarah and Ross Pengilley to let us use space at their nursery for potting up, which made the task much simpler. The sale was the most successful ever; after expenses were paid, we raised \$5000. We donated some of the unsold plants to Streetsville Secondary School for use in their courtyard garden.

At our December workshop members made floral centrepieces and wren houses. We had many good speakers this year; on a cold January night Glenn Brunetti showed us how to cook with edible flowers.

We held our garden tour in July with a potluck dinner at the Leslie Log House afterwards. \mathcal{F}

Membership Report

Since I have not been the Membership chair for the most part of this past year, I really do not have much to say. Lynn Merritt took over from me last December and pretty much kept things the way I had set them up over the past two years.

I do not have the numbers of our Society from the beginning to the end of the year; however, our membership remained fairly stable and our attendance seemed to be steady as well. I would still say we have an average attendance of 70 members pre- meeting which is excellent!

Rotary Park Report

This has been my first year since taking over from Ruthanne Behoo who had worked tirelessly for a good number of years working at and managing the park on behalf of the society.

We spent a lot of time clearing the weeds and invasive plants and moving those plants that had become too crowded. When the city extended the park alongside and behind the parking area two years ago, they increased the work for us significantly, especially as the ground there is very dry and rock hard.

We eventually got all cleared and two loads of pine bark mulch added to help make it through the long, hot summer.

On October 22, we planted two serviceberry trees in remembrance of Streetsville Jason and 75 tulip bulbs commemorating Canada's 150 anniversary. We were helped by a small group of teenagers organized by Streetsville library, and if successful, we hope they will work with us again.

We had a total of 19 volunteers contributing well over 100 hours of work during the year. I am very grateful to all those that came out, but especially to Eleonora Roberts, Henry Schouten, Nick and Enza Lafratta and Janice Ward, who all helped on multiple occasions.

Next year we hope to make further progress and for this we will need more regular volunteers for every other Tuesday morning in the park. I hope to see you there.

Flower Show Report

In March 2016, a new Flower Show
Committee was formed with the mandate of
continuation of SHS flower shows. The new
Committee, comprised of dedicated members
with a history of participating in, and interest in
supporting ongoing Flower Shows, discussed
various options and concurred with the concept
that the best way forward long term was to
share the roles and required activities with a
larger team of trained members. I accepted the



role of Flower Show Chair and the Committee members contributed their ideas at the first group meetings, and volunteered their time in set-up, clerking, recording, and clean-up at 2016 shows. In our early planning meetings, we benefitted from past SHS practices and the kind guidance and suggestions of experienced conveners from the **Georgetown Horticultural Society.**

Due to SHS hosting of the District 15 AGM in April 2016, it was decided that we would not proceed with the April flower show because of resource and time constraints. The May 2016 show was the first under the new Committee. Accordingly, we decided to assign a competitor number at each show, to be recorded on a revised entry form. This action reduced the required time to record results significantly, and allowed the show volunteers involved in the judging portion of the shows to join the General meeting after the coffee break.

The new Committee continues to follow OHA recommendations that different judges be brought in for each show; exhibitors and volunteers have learned much from their constructive comments this season.

A huge "thank you" all of our SHS members who have entered the Flower Shows this season, and to the dedicated Committee members: Pam Blair, Renate Wust, Janice Ward, Wendy Arrighi, Andrea Vertolli, Anita King, Alex King, Carol Ashford, Shirley Boyes, and Debbie Lemire. A special note of acknowledgement and thanks goes Alex King who revised recording forms and has taken on the responsibility of recording and tabulating results.

With four flower shows now "under our belt" the Flower Show Committee looks forward to more rewarding shows in 2017. We will be meeting in the New Year to develop show schedules and discuss ways to continuously improve the show experience for volunteers and exhibitors. Tree Planting Report

On Saturday October 24, 2015, 20 volunteers planted 25 trees on the Pinchin farm/Leslie Log House property donating 51.5 hours of volunteer time. A huge thank you goes out to all who participated. We planted five varieties of native trees, sugar maple, red maple, bur oak, red oak, and white pine. These trees would all have been present on this land before it was settled in the 1820s.

For the past week most of us had been keeping an eye on the weather forecast as it changed almost daily from sun, to all day rain to

rain in the afternoon only. At 8.30 a.m. when the trees were delivered, it wasn't raining.

By 10 a.m., we were ready to plant. We dug the holes, planted the trees, mulched and staked the trees, then watered them, and remulched the 40 trees we planted last year. It



started to drizzle in mid-morning; we were just about finished by noon when it started to rain heavily. The group picture had to be taken inside the Log House due to the rain.

Lots of preparation was needed to get the plant sale off to a good start. We decided to use painted popsicle sticks this year for pricing, which worked more efficiently than the previous use of straws.

Plants were dropped off at various members' houses and taken to the Pengilley's nursery, who graciously let us use their property for potting up. We had a good turnout of volunteers for potting and good weather as well. Potted plants were

distributed to various "holding" spots and kept there to be cared for and watered.

This year we had to purchase more lawn



signs, which were expensive (over \$300), as many signs had not been returned to us from last year's sale. Fortunately, a member's mother was moving and wanted her garden cleaned up prior to the sale of her house.

Monica Ross, Dean Scully and I worked a full day in her garden and she in turn presented the horticultural society with a cheque for \$300 for our efforts.

The night before the sale, cars, trucks and trailers were loaded up to ensure an early delivery to the Leslie Log House for the sale.

Also a crew was out putting up directional signs so customers could find their way to the sale.

We did lots of advertising for the sale, Facebook, newspaper ads, flyers, and notification on various garden websites and as a result we had a great turn out the day of the sale, with a big lineup of prospective customers in the parking lot waiting for us to open.

Some members provided refreshments for those working the day of the sale and we had lots of help with volunteers unloading plants, customer service, carryout and a manned information station to help those customers make selections.

The weather was agreeable and sales were good. This year the plant sale had the largest profit ever.... just over \$5,000. After the sale the site was cleaned up and a week or two later pots and trays were sorted, signs retrieved, plant labels and price sticks organized and stored.

Many, many thanks to all of you who dug up plants, delivered plants, potted plants, watered plants, moved plants and in general did anything and everything to make this years' plant sale a great success!!!

Speaker's Report

Our goal is to provide a diverse group of speakers who will share their horticultural knowledge on a wide range of topics with our members. The purpose is to provide you with new ideas, tools, techniques, and approaches that will improve your gardening experience. This past year, we enjoyed a diverse series of entertaining and informative talks.

We started the 2015-2016 program season in September 2015 with Cathie Kavassalis who spoke on "Fantastic Ferns" revealing the wide variety of these plants. At our meeting in October Heinke Thiessen's talk was "Made for the Shade". Heinke introduced a selection of plants suitable for shady areas.

In November, the society held its
AGM. There were no speakers that month. The
Christmas workshops were held in
December. Nicky Hall demonstrated and
guided the making of Christmas arrangements
and Patrick Kelly from the Peel-Halton
Woodlands and Wildlife Stewardship helped us
assemble wren birdhouses.



Glenn Brunetti was our speaker in January 2016. His topic was "Growing and Using Edible Flowers and Herbs". His samplings and recipes were of great interest. In February "The Wonder of Worms" was presented by Cathie Nesbitt. Cathie stressed the environmental benefit of vermicomposting and the diversion of unused foodstuffs, all with a great sense of humour.

In March, Wolfe Bonham spoke on "Creating Spaces that Resonate with our Souls". This talk focussed on garden styles. His classification of types of gardens, and the plantings appropriate to each, was a powerful guide to choosing how to design (or redesign) our own gardens. At the April meeting, Angie Allen presented 'Weed free, water free, no mow", a talk that emphasized efficient mulching practices to simplify the maintenance of our gardens.

In May, Stephen Biggs spoke on "Edibles in Urban Landscapes". Why not include vegetables with your flowers? He introduced us to the dramatic cardoon. The last meeting of the series was in June. Christine Gilhuly spoke on "Lazy Gardening" emphasizing the hardiness of many available perennial flowering plants, with little need for attention. By selecting these plants, she has grown a vigorous garden with no need for watering.

Cost for the speakers this fiscal year totalled \$1650. \mathfrak{T}

How to Prepare Roses for Winter

It depends on the kinds of roses you have and the climate they grow in. Surprisingly, cold temperatures are less threatening than drying winds and alternating freezes and thaws.

Hardy shrub roses, such as native or rugosa roses or those from the David Austen, Explorer and Morden series, don't require special care, but do appreciate mulch. To prevent wind damage, tie up the canes of hardy climbers. Wrap the canes and crowns of tender climbers with two layers of burlap, or lay each plant on its side in a trench and bury it completely.

Trim the canes of tender hybrid teas, floribundas and grandifloras down to about 45 centimetres, then cover each crown in a 30-centimetre mound of soil or mulch, and tamp it into place.

For even more protection, place a wire or plastic collar around each bush, then fill it with leaves and mulch (loosely, to allow some air circulation) and heap snow on top in the winter.

Next year, remember to stop fertilizing at the end of July to discourage tender new growth. Stop deadheading about six weeks before the first frost, as well, to let hips develop and encourage dormancy. Do keep watering, though, until the ground freezes. Then, after the first hard frost, remove any leaves on the bush and on the soil underneath, to discourage overwintering insects and diseases.

Fall/Winter Pond Checklist

 Reduce the number of leaves falling into the pond with netting or remove



them with a pond net

- Clean out the pond
- Cut back dead or dying aquatic plant foliage during the fall
- Purchase a wheat-germ-based pond food developed especially for a spring and fall diet
- Disconnect the pump, filter and UV clarifier before water freezes
- Store UV clarifier indoors for protection
- Store filters indoors (if manufacturer's directions suggest)
- Purchase or have the pond de-icer ready for installation (in northern climates in risk of ponds freezing over).
 It will melt a small opening in the surface, allowing noxious gasses to escape.
