Class 1 Aster – perennial – 2 sprays Class 2 Actaea (bugbane) -1 stem Class 3 Begonia – tuberous – 1 bloom shown with foliage Class 4 Calendula – 3 blooms **Class 5** Chrysanthemum – double – 1 spray **Class 6** Chrysanthemum – single – 1 spray Class 7 Coleus – 3 stems, 1 cultivar Class 8 Dahlia – 8" or more – 1 bloom Class 9 Dahlia – different cultivars – 3 blooms in a vase Class 10 Hydrangea - 1 bloom Class 12 Marigold – any variety – 3 blooms Class 13 Ornamental grasses – 3 cultivars – 3 stems Class 14 Rudbeckia – 1 stem Class 15 Salvia – 3 stems – 1 cultivar Class 16 Sedum – any cultivar – 3 stems

Class 17 Shrub or tree branch with berries – 1 branch under 36" Class 18 Sunflower – AOV – 1 stem Class 19 Zinnia – 2" or less – 1 bloom Class 20 Any other annual not listed – 1 stem or bloom Class 21 Any other perennial not listed – 1 stem or bloom Class 22 Cacti and succulents – AOV – 1 specimen

- Fruit is not to be polished
- Root vegetables have foliage removed to 2 cm
- Beans have the calyx, tip and a portion of the stem attached.

## **Spring Colour**

Plant these flower bulbs in the fall for spring blooms. See our handy **fall-planted bulb chart**—and tips for planting bulbs in autumn.

Fall bulbs like tulips produce the first blooms of next year's season. The bulbs spend the winter making roots and come up early in the spring.

So if you think that autumn's the time to stop gardening, think again! Fall gardening time is here, and it's bulb-planting time!

#### TIPS FOR PLANTING BULBS IN AUTUMN

 In the fall, you'll find bulbs to purchase everywhere! Make sure you buy your bulbs from a reputable nursery, garden center, or catalog. Second-rate bulbs product secondrate flowers or don't sprout at all.

When to Plant Bulbs:


- Plant any time before the ground freezes. Ideally, plant your bulbs soon after you purchase them.
- Some bulbs need to be treated as annuals instead of perennials; they'll bloom once and then they're done. For example, you will have to plant dahlia bulbs again each year. Still,

they are a beautiful sight to behold and worth it! Other fall bulbs like daffodils will act as perennials and come up year after year.

#### How to Plant Bulbs:

- Select a site with lots of sun and well-drained soil. Work a few inches of compost in the soil.
- Plant bulbs generously in case some do not sprout. And plant them in random order and spacing for a more natural appearance. If you love groves of daffodils and blanketed landscapes of tulips, be prepared to buy and plant a large quantity of bulbs!
- In general, plant bulbs at a depth of three times the width of the bulb.
- After planting, apply fertilizer low in nitrogen, such as a 9-6-6 formulation. If your soil's sandy, plant bulbs slightly deeper; in clay soils, slightly shallower.
- Water well after planting. Apply mulch to keep the weeds down and hold in moisture.
- Do you have voles or squirrels? Consider planting your bulbs in a "cage" fashioned with chicken wire.

## Jobs for the month of October (Zone 6)

#### General

- Rake up leaves;
- Apply slow-acting fertilizers;
- Provide frost protection to tender plants outdoors;
- Clean out greenhouse.

## Trees and shrubs

- Rake up leaves;
- Plant evergreens;
- Prepare ground for planting deciduous trees and shrubs and hedges;
- Trim young hedges;
- Take hardwood cuttings.

#### Lawns

- Rake up leaves and worm casts;
- Finish sowing seed or laying turf;
- Aerate the lawn.

## Vegetables

- Cut down asparagus foliage and mulch beds;
- Finish lifting root crops;
- Finish harvesting summer crops;
- Lift herbs for winter use.

## Flowers

- Lift and store dahlias, gladioli, cut down tuberous begonias and cannas;
- Protect still-flowering chrysanthemums from frost;
- Plant bought perennials and lift and divide existing perennials;
- Clear out summer annuals. 🔊
